



Mission

The mission of AgrAbility is to enhance the quality of life for farmers, ranchers, and other agricultural workers with disabilities, so that they, their families, and their communities continue to succeed in rural America.







What is AgrAbility?



- Program for farmers, veterans, and farmworkers who have experienced an injury or disability
- AgrAbility offers education and assistance to eliminate barriers, accommodate limitations, and help you continue farming!
- AgrAbility involves Extension educators, disability experts, rural professionals, and volunteers who work in partnership to offer a variety of services at no cost to clients.

Do I qualify?

- Focus on those involved in agriculture
- For the AgrAbility program, a person with a disability is defined as an individual with a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities, such as work, daily living and education.
 - Ex. arthritis, spinal cord injuries/paralysis, back impairments, amputations, brain injury, visual impairments, hearing impairments, disabling diseases, cerebral palsy, respiratory impairments, head injury, etc.





So, you or someone you know who works in agriculture (farmer, veteran, or farm worker) has a disability and could use some help....

What can AgrAbility do for them?





Services Offered

- ldentifying farmers, veterans or farmworkers with disabilities and/or chronic diseases
- Conducting FREE onsite farm assessments
- Recommending safe equipment or devices
- Providing educational opportunities and informational resources
- Referring clients to other service providers for potential assistance









Onsite Farm Assessment



Come out to your farm to assess current and potential barriers

Evaluate a piece of equipment to determine best use of a lift or other assistive technology





Onsite Farm Assessment

Recommend adjustments to buildings, equipment, farm routine, etc.

Get a sense of your daily farm work and routine with your disability

We are available year-round!





What is Assistive Technology?



- Assistive technology consists of practices, devices, tools, modifications, processes and a special knowledge of science and engineering that are used to enable a person to perform a desired task.
- In the context of this program, assistive technology enables a person with a disability to complete desired tasks within an agricultural setting.

The Toolbox: Agricultural Tools, Equipment, Machinery & Buildings for Farmers and Ranchers with Physical Disabilities is a resource that contains assistive technology solutions for farmers, ranchers, and other agricultural workers with disabilities.

You can View by Category or Search the Toolbox to find products, designs, ideas, techniques, and suggestions.

In addition to the database, there are several technical reports, providing techniques and suggestions focused on a specific topic on farming/ranching with a disability.

The Toolbox is based upon the print and CD versions of the product bearing the same name, published by the Breaking New Ground Resource Center (BNG). The new online format allows for added features, such as enhanced search and browse capabilities, video clips, hyperlinks to the web sites of product suppliers, full-color photographs, and continuously updated solution fact sheets.

Mission Statement

Farm Rescue is a 501(c)(3) and our mission is to help family farms and ranches bridge crises so they have an



opportunity to continue viable operations. Farm Rescue provides planting, haying, harvesting, commodity hauling (crops & hay) and livestock feeding assistance to farm and ranch families that have experienced a major injury, illness or natural disaster. We have assisted nearly 1,000 farm and ranch families since our inception in 2005!

Mission Statement

One of the biggest financial drains on a family is an unexpected medical injury or illness and, of course, a



natural disaster. It is even more pronounced on a farm where a family's livelihood depends on the ability to plant, harvest or provide for their herd.

Farm Rescue gives families a chance to continue their livelihood by providing the necessary equipment and manpower (free of charge) to get the job done.



Farm\Rescue President & Founder Bill Gross

Farm Rescue was founded by Bill Gross a native of North Dakota. Unfortunately it was not possible to continue the family's farming legacy at a young age due to financial constraints.

Bill went on to attend the University of North Dakota to secure an undergraduate degree in BBA and was later awarded an honorary Doctorate degree of Human Letters. During his time at the university, he also secured several pilot ratings and an Airline Transport Pilot certificate.

However, his heart never left the farming and ranching community. From a bird's eye view as a Boeing 747 Captain, flying back and forth across our nation at 40,000 feet, Bill kept looking at the farms below. The changing demographics of rural America - fewer farms, less children per family, fewer neighbors - troubled him. And always in the back of his mind, he remembered his father's concern about what would happen to their farm should anything debilitating happen.

Bill Gross launched Farm Rescue in 2005 and continues to serve in a volunteer capacity as Chairman of the board. The nonprofit has become a well-known, successful organization with dedicated volunteers throughout the nation and a strong following of supporters.




